Sight Conservation Committee Activities of the Past Year

The Damascus Lions Club expended \$1,821 for sixteen financially strapped eye care patients in the Damascus/Clarksburg area during the Lions 2017-2018 fiscal year. Eleven of these sixteen cases were schoolchildren. Our Sight Conservation Committee budget was \$2,500. When an individual has a prescription and is asking for help in obtaining glasses, we refer the individual to Eyeballs in the Damascus Weiss shopping center. When an individual needs a vision exam and eyewear, we refer the individual to Mt. Airy Eye Care in Mt. Airy. Referrals come from county social services organizations, the Damascus Senior Center, school health staff, the vision providers, and directly from the individuals needing services. This is a very fine offering of our Club to the financially-needy residents of Damascus and Clarksburg. We can be proud of our sight conservation service to our community. Lion Wayne Marr

Damascus Community Fair September 6 - 9

Entry Night

I had arrived at the Damascus Fire Department Activities Center to get things ready for the entry night crew to take entries for the inside exhibits for the fair. A few exhibitors had already arrived and were eagerly waiting with their prize winning entries. Some of my help for the evening began to arrive shortly thereafter. Lion Julie Sain had showed up along with King Lion Chris & were quickly in their seats to help the exhibitors with their entry forms & tags and answer any questions to be answered. Lion Jenny Redifer-Allen joined them shortly after. After the exhibitors made their way past these ladies they stood in line to be placed at a table that seated an entry taker. Included in these group of helpers were Lions Dale Ryan, Mary Frances, & partner in service Fran Peters. Lion Pasty McKenzie split her time as the greeter who directed the exhibitors to the available entry takers and then later sat at one of the entry tables to help take entries. At 8 o'clock the roll up door was closed and any exhibitor inside the building was helped to finish with their entries. By The 9 o'clock hour everyone was entered and the judging had begun. A total of 425 different exhibitors had entered over 2000 exhibits for the fair. These numbers were down from last year's totals by 18%. The weather did not help this year for flowers or the vegetable gardens. Humidity on the day of entry was not good for baking some of our past award winning bakers had commented. Among all the help that we get for entry night- our Lions are a big part and show up and prove once again that we do serve our community. Tough Popcorn

No matter how tough the popcorn was from the damp weather, fair goers didn't hesitate to take their bag and some did not hesitate to return for refills!!!

The weather was unkind to the fair this year. In my 25 plus years in treating the fair goers to the salty delicacy (Lions have done it for 18 of those years), I have experienced four nasty weather related occasions. All of which were spearheaded by hurricanes such as this year. This year we closed the booth

and vacated the premises on Sunday morning after listening to a weather report. School tours were down this year. Served 3 schools and several daycare, preschool and eldercare folks though. Friday morning we



had enough popcorn bagged for 300 and gave out about 100. So with bagged popcorn sealed in tubs and the popper full, we waited for the attendance to pick-up. By 4 PM, all the banked popcorn was gone and we struggled to keep up with the demand. Saturday was a continual popping and bagging day. Fifteen Lions, one Leo and one Partner-In-Service served 1200 people, working 125 hours at a cost of \$138. We Serve! Well done Lions! Thanks to all those who signed up for a time slot during the three days and many of you serving multiple shifts. Our efforts do not go unnoticed! There was one Lion who could write of job description about how to reach out to the fair goers though. IPP Lion John stood in front of the booth, greeted fair goers with a smile and asked if they would like to have the popcorn that he held in his hands. He was keeping the baggers and poppers busy!!! The meeting was called to order at 6:59pm by KL Chris Fletcher.

Minutes from the August meeting were approved as published in the Lions Tale.

Treasurers Reports:

Financial statements were presented by their corresponding treasurers with the following summary balances for the month ending August 31, 2018:

Foundation Treasurer Mary Frances noted that smile.amazon.com netted \$10.27 this month. Members are to be reminded to use this painless fundraiser. It all adds up.

Both reports were accepted by unanimous vote.

Secretary report:

- There are only 3 unpaid members for July. Marcia shared with the board that the Olney club collects dues in advance of the end of the semi-annual billing period and unpaid members at that point are dropped in good standing. They may rejoin with no penalty. Mary Frances would like to know how many members drop and reinstate under this model and expressed that collecting dues in advance may not be well received by the membership. Of the 3 unpaid members, VP Patricia will contact one, the sponsor will contact a second and the board voted to make Helen Boyer an honorary member. Helen was the first female member of the Damascus club and has been a member for 29 years. She is unable to participate due to advanced age (94). A presentation in her honor will be made at Charter Night.
- Membership application for transfer member Bob Breiner was approved by the board. He will be inducted into the Damascus club at Charter Night. His prior club disbanded in June.
- Lions Camp Merrick would like to form a branch club to take advantage of Lion benefits. The Waldorf club will be asked to sponsor, but Marcia asked if they were not interested, would Damascus be their sponsor. The opinions of the members present were that a club that is physically closer to the camp would be a better choice.

Committee Reports:

• **Community Fair**: Lion Tess thanked the members who helped make registration go smoothly. The total number of entries was down this year with the normal number of exhibitors generally between 5-600, this year there were only 428. Attendance was down as well, but this may have been due to three straight days of rain during the fair. The same declines have been noted at the MoCo & Frederick fairs. She also couldn't resist mentioning that Gladhills won the ice cream churning contest with their fancy flavor... chocolate. It was high time they finally won! Our sweet corn, raspberry swirl did not ribbon this year in spite of the appropriateness of the ingredients used. The cake auction brought in \$17,000 and continues to be popular no matter what the weather. Lion Mary Frances reported that 1200 bags of popcorn were handed out over 2 days as it was decided to close the popcorn booth for Sunday with the downpour of rain. Half the schools did not accept popcorn this year. 125 volunteer hours were clocked for the popcorn booth. Expenses were \$138 and there is popcorn and bags enough for next year on hand. 15 Lions helped with the booth and donations

- of \$35.87 were received. The popcorn machine is now housed in the Barry's barn and Lion Wayne Marr is the overseer.
- **Pancake Breakfast**: Date: 10/27 Lion Mary Frances will be sending the flyer to the clubs in our zone and has secured a sponsor to cover the cost of printing tickets. The breakfast is the same day as a scrapbooking event and we may get additional customers from there. The flyer has been submitted to The Voice for distribution throughout the district along with a notification of our upcoming blood drive on 11/8.
- White Cane: The date has been <u>moved</u>. It is now going to be October 3-5 which is Wed-Fri. No Saturday time was available so we're going to see what happens without a Saturday.

Old Business:

- The 75th Anniversary Committee now consists of Lions Carol Stone and Mary Frances Gosnell. Contact either of them to help plan this gala event.
- 6 bags of food were collected at the last meeting for Damascus Help. This is an ongoing collection and members are to be reminded to bring a non-perishable donation to each meeting.
- Preschool vision screening for Stop, Drop & Play will be scheduled. Lion Gary Burdette will obtain the equipment and provide training for us. Additional locations for screenings include MOPS at Neelsville Church, Montomery UMC preschool and Cookies with Santa at Gladhill's on Dec. 1.
- Lions stickers will be ordered for applying to File of Life kits. More kits need to be located or purchased.
- The District Cabinet has been invited to Charter Night and DG Andrea asked to install our new member.
